Reserve early! Reserve campsites, yurts, and the group picnic shelter two days to nine months in advance by calling Reservations Northwest (1-800-452-5687) or visiting www.oregonstateparks.org.

William M. Tugman State Park offers year-round camping, a scenic freshwater lake, and access to the Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area right next door.

Year-Round Camping

- 94 electrical sites with water
- 16 yurts (eight pet-friendly, A, B, K, L, M, N, O and P)
- Paved parking, picnic table, and fire rings at all sites
- Hot showers and flush toilets
- Hiker/biker camp
- RV dump station

Universal Access

Two campsites (B28 and B30) and 11 yurts (C, F, G, H, I, J, L, M, N, O, and P) are accessible to campers with disabilities.

Discovery Season

From October 1 - April 30, you can rent full, electric, or tent sites at most state parks for less. At William M. Tugman, you can get \$3 off summer rates.

Yurts!

A yurt is a domed tent with structural support, a wood floor, and a lockable wooden door. It has lights, heating, and beds with vinyl-covered mattresses. A bunk bed sleeps three and a futon couch sleeps two. A fire ring, picnic table, and paved parking are right outside. Up to two pets (cats and/or dogs only) are permitted in the pet-friendly facilities.

Room to Play

Tugman's day-use area features broad green lawns with plenty of space for groups. A gazebo-style reservable picnic shelter is perfect for family reunions.

Eel Lake

Blue, forest-ringed Eel Lake is one of a chain of freshwater jewels just east of the coastline. Its waters are perfect for fishing, swimming, canoeing, sailing, and boating (please respect the 10 m.p.h. speed limit).

Park facilities include a boat ramp and fishing dock modified for use by anglers with disabilities. Fish for bass and rainbow trout from the dock or a boat. The lake also has crappie, steelhead, and catch-and-release coho salmon.

A trail around the south end of the lake allows hikers to explore the lake's many inlets. Look for osprey, crane, eagle, deer, and other forest animals as you walk through stands of spruce, cedar, fir, and alder.

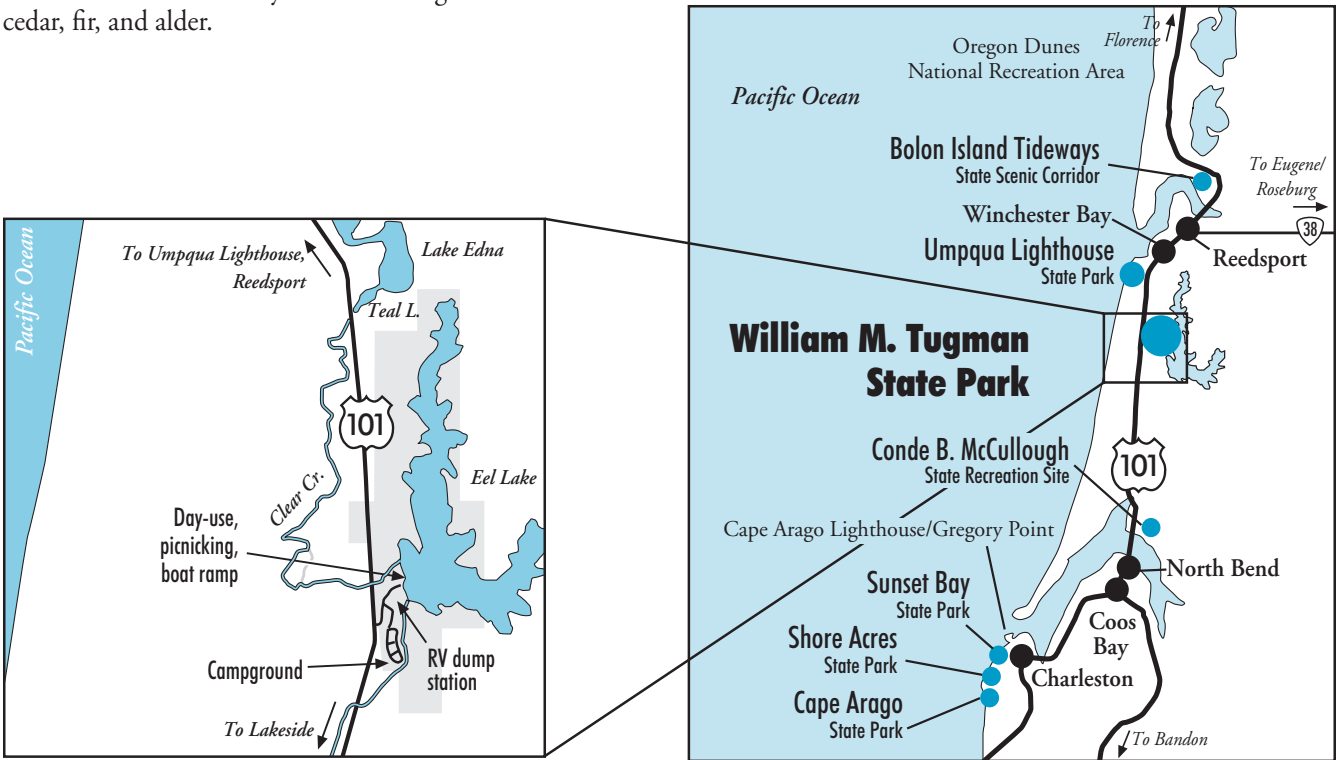

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What's Nearby

Winchester Bay, six miles to the north, offers year-round crabbing, fishing, whale watching, golfing, shopping, and dining. It is also the home of the Umpqua River Lighthouse and museum.

Umpqua River Lighthouse was the first lighthouse commissioned on the Oregon Coast. Originally built on the north spit of the Umpqua River in 1857, it was destroyed just four years later by a severe storm. Today's lighthouse has a 65-foot tower and sits on the south side of Winchester Bay. The lighthouse and museum are maintained by the Douglas County Parks and Recreation Department. Tours run May through October. Call 541-271-4631 for current schedules and information.



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
