Reserve early! Reserve campsites, yurts, and group areas two days to nine months in advance by calling Reservations Northwest (1-800-452-5687). Campsites and yurts are also reservable online through www.oregonstateparks.org.

Hidden in a forest between Cape Foulweather and Yaquina Head, Beverly Beach State Park's creekside campground is one of the state's largest. Some campsites and the park's day-use area are just steps away from miles of ocean beach.

Year-Round Camping

- 53 full-hookup sites (sewer, electricity, water)
- 75 electrical sites with water (32 pull-through)
- 128 tent sites with water nearby
- 21 yurts (two pet-friendly yurts, A24 and F36)
- Paved parking, picnic table, and fire ring at all sites
- Cable TV access in A-loop yurts and at 30 campsites
- Three seasonal group tent camping areas
- Hiker/biker camp
- Flush toilets and hot showers
- RV dump station (please use the station to dump full holding tanks instead of campsite connections, which may overflow)
- Firewood for sale (see park hosts)
- Yurt meeting hall

Universal Access

Three campsites (F10, F11, and F34) and six yurts (A6, A8, A25, A26, F27, and F36) are accessible to campers with disabilities.

Discovery Season

From October 1–April 30, you can rent a full, electric, or tent site for less. At most state parks, including Beverly Beach, you can get \$4 off summer rates.

Yurts!

A yurt is a domed tent with structural support, a wood floor, and a lockable wooden door. It has lights, heating, and beds with vinyl-covered mattresses. A bunk bed sleeps three and a futon couch sleeps two. A fire ring, picnic table, and paved parking are right outside. Up to two pets (cats and/or dogs only) are allowed in the pet-friendly facilities.

A Learning Environment

Learn about bats, raccoons, beavers, and salmon from our interpretive programs and nature trail displays. Live evening presentations and Junior Ranger activities are offered Memorial Day through Labor Day.

You can also learn about the relationship between healthy streams and salmon migrations by following the Spencer Creek Nature Trail. Watch the creek empty into the ocean along this short trail leading under a highway bridge from the park's creekside day-use area.

Whale Watching

There are six official Whale Watching Spoken Here sites within just a few miles of Beverly Beach.

- Cape Foulweather
- Devil's Punch Bowl State Natural Area
- Rocky Creek State Scenic Viewpoint
- Depoe Bay
- Boiler Bay State Scenic Viewpoint
- Yaquina Head

The Whale Watching Center, located just north of the U.S. Highway 101 bridge in Depoe Bay, is home to the Whale Watching Spoken Here program.

More to See

Yaquina Head Outstanding Natural Area features trails, tidepools, a visitor center, and close-up views of seabird nesting sites. Tours of the Yaquina Head lighthouse are offered during the summer months; call 1-800-551-6949 for more information and current schedules.

Newport offers charter boats, launching and moorage facilities, and boat and equipment rentals. Crabbing and clamming are popular activities. The historic bayfront has restaurants, shopping, art galleries, a unique museum, and a waxworks. On the south side of the bay, the Oregon Coast Aquarium showcases the beauty and diversity of sea life along the Oregon coast. Nearby, the Mark O. Hatfield Marine Science Center has marine displays created by Oregon State University scientists. Newport's Seafood and Wine Festival is a popular event in late February. The city also stages a Fourth of July fireworks show.

Depoe Bay, north of Cape Foulweather, has boating facilities, a charter boat fleet, and a spouting horn, which emits a geyser-like spray when ocean waves surge into the tunneled rock formations.
