Yurts!

Enjoy the year-round comforts of a domed tent with structural support, a plywood floor, a lockable wooden door, lights, heating, and beds with vinyl-covered mattresses. A bunk bed sleeps three, and a futon couch sleeps two. A fire ring, picnic table, and paved parking are right outside. Up to two pets (cats and/or dogs only) are allowed in the pet-friendly yurt.

Boating and Other Water Sports

Devil's Lake offers a variety of activities, including sailing, waterskiing, jet skiing, windsurfing, knee boarding, canoeing, and kayaking. A boat ramp in the East Devil's Lake day-use area accommodates boaters. A moorage dock is adjacent to the campground. Please call 541-994-2002 for information on guided kayak trips offered periodically throughout the week, Memorial Day through Labor Day.

A Choice of Fish

Devil's Lake is 22 feet deep at its deepest point, but averages more shallow depths across its 678 acres. The lake abounds with freshwater fish, including rainbow trout, yellow perch,

can be caught year-round. However, if you happen to catch the lake's most exotic resident, the Chinese Grass Carp (also known as the White Amur), you must release it; this fish was stocked to control vegetation. When young, grass carp can eat their own body weight in weeds. They grow up to 26 inches long.

Watch summer presentations about the area's abundant flora and fauna from a large, grassy area. When programs are not scheduled, the field is available for outdoor activities; it features picnic tables and a fire ring. Check with park staff for details.

Birding Paradise

The wetland at Devil's Lake is one of the primary wintering grounds for flocks of migratory geese and ducks. There are also several Osprey and bald eagle nests in the vicinity.

Devil's Lake State Recreation Area is located in Lincoln City, where seven miles of shoreline draws beach enthusiasts, particularly kite flyers, from across the state. You can walk to the beach from the campground. A 700-foot-long boardwalk leads through wetlands to the D River and a primitive boat launch. From there, a short gravel trail leads to a sidewalk along Highway 101. A crosswalk provides safe access to the beach at D River State Recreation Site.
