Reserve early! Reserve campsites and yurts two days to nine months in advance by calling Reservations Northwest (1-800-452-5687) or visiting www.oregonstateparks.org.

Camping near Devil's Lake means access to fishing, boating, and wildlife viewing; shopping in Lincoln City; and beachcombing on the nearby ocean shore.

Year-Round Camping

- 28 full-hookup sites (sewer, electricity, and water) plus cable TV
- Five electrical sites (all with water, four with cable TV)
- 54 tent sites with water nearby
- 10 yurts (one pet-friendly)
- Paved parking, picnic table, and fire ring at all sites
- Hiker/biker camp
- Flush toilets and hot showers
- Firewood for sale (see volunteer park hosts)
- RV dump stations: 3.5 miles southwest at 4900 SE Inlet Avenue in Lincoln City; 20 miles south at Beverly Beach State Park; and 56 miles north at Cape Lookout State Park
- 12 boat moorage slips (no launch sites)

Note: The day-use area across the lake (off East Devil's Lake Road) offers a picnic area and boat launch.

Universal Access

Two campsites (B20 and B25) and two yurts (B24 and C28) are accessible to campers with disabilities.

Discovery Season

From October 1–April 30, you can rent a full, electric, or tent site for less. At most state parks, including Devil's Lake, you can get \$4 off summer rates. Current rates are posted at the registration booth.

Yurts!

Enjoy the year-round comforts of a domed tent with structural support, a plywood floor, a lockable wooden door, lights, heating, and beds with vinyl-covered mattresses. A bunk bed sleeps three, and a futon couch sleeps two. A fire ring, picnic table, and paved parking are right outside. Up to two pets (cats and/or dogs only) are allowed in the pet-friendly yurt.

Boating and Other Water Sports

Devil's Lake offers a variety of activities, including sailing, waterskiing, jet skiing, windsurfing, knee boarding, canoeing, and kayaking. A boat ramp in the East Devil's Lake day-use area accommodates boaters. A moorage dock is adjacent to the campground. Please call 541-994-2002 for information on guided kayak trips offered periodically throughout the week, Memorial Day through Labor Day.

A Choice of Fish

Devil's Lake is 22 feet deep at its deepest point, but averages more shallow depths across its 678 acres. The lake abounds with freshwater fish, including rainbow trout, yellow perch, catfish, black crappie, largemouth bass, and bluegill. All can be caught year-round. However, if you happen to catch the lake's most exotic resident, the Chinese Grass Carp (also known as the White Amur), you must release it; this fish was stocked to control vegetation. When young, grass carp can eat their own body weight in weeds. They grow up to 26 inches long.

Amphitheater

Watch summer presentations about the area's abundant flora and fauna from a large, grassy area. When programs are not scheduled, the field is available for outdoor activities; it features picnic tables and a fire ring. Check with park staff for details.

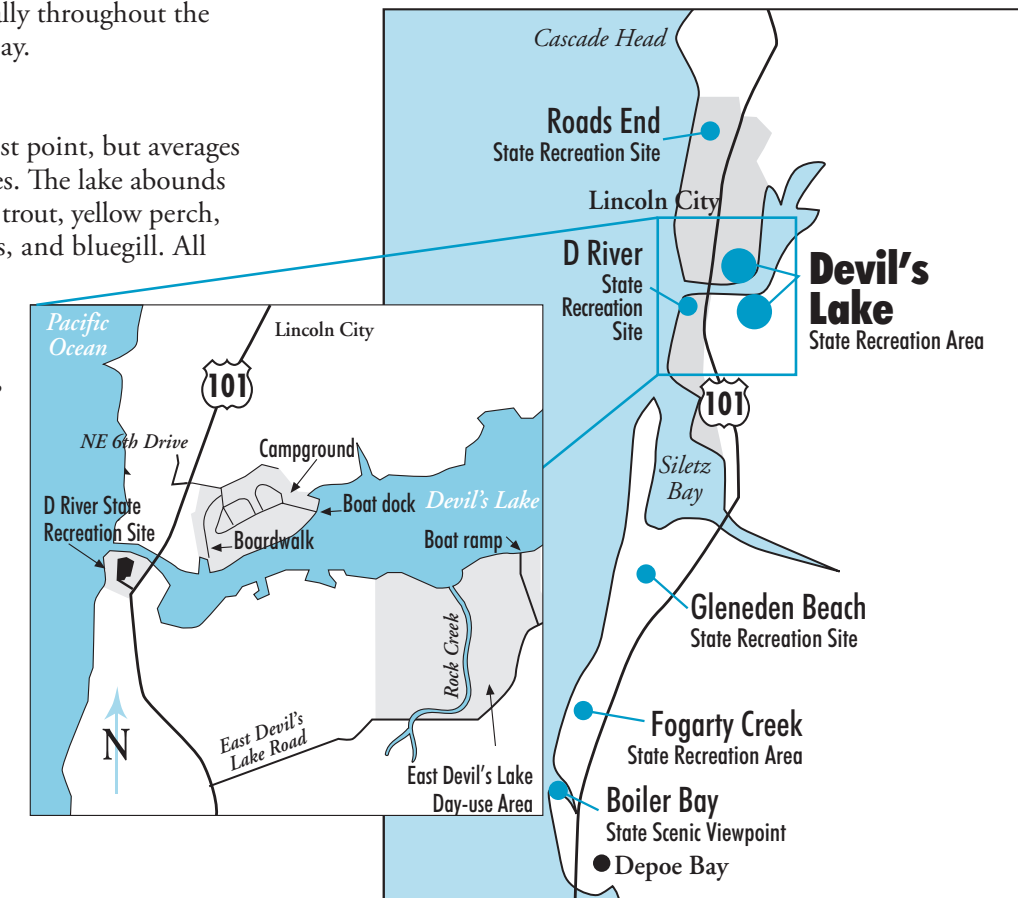

Birding Paradise

The wetland at Devil's Lake is one of the primary wintering grounds for flocks of migratory geese and ducks. There are also several Osprey and bald eagle nests in the vicinity.

Sounds of the Surf and the City

Devil's Lake State Recreation Area is located in Lincoln City, where seven miles of shoreline draws beach enthusiasts, particularly kite flyers, from across the state. You can walk to the beach from the campground. A 700-foot-long boardwalk leads through wetlands to the D River and a primitive boat launch. From there, a short gravel trail leads to a sidewalk along Highway 101. A crosswalk provides safe access to the beach at D River State Recreation Site.



Play it safe on the beach! Stay off logs, know the tide schedule, and don't turn your back on the ocean.

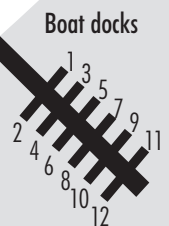
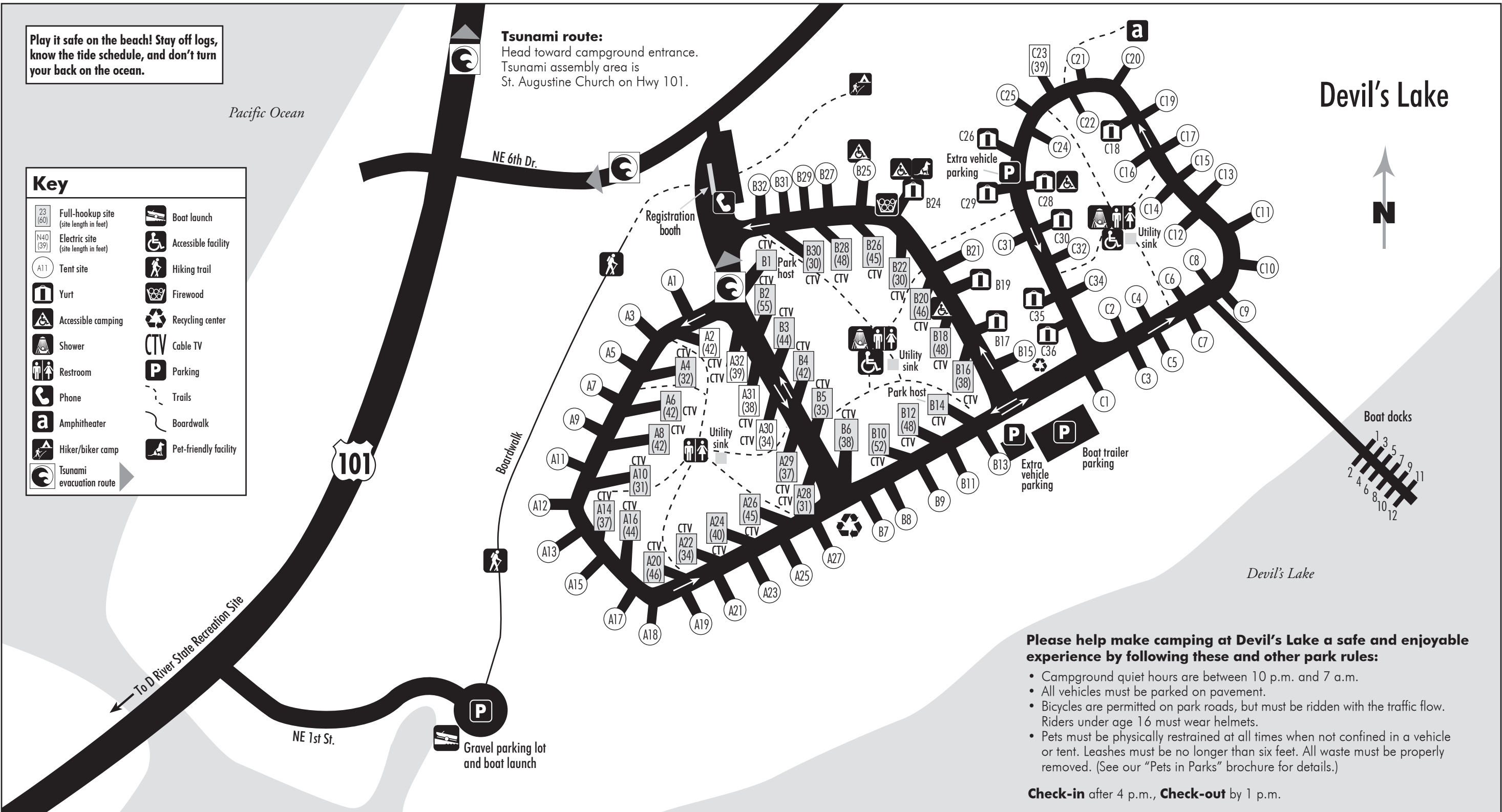
Tsunami route:

Please help make camping at Devil's Lake a safe and enjoyable experience by following these and other park rules:

- Campground quiet hours are between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.
- All vehicles must be parked on pavement.
- Bicycles are permitted on park roads, but must be ridden with the traffic flow. Riders under age 16 must wear helmets.
- Pets must be physically restrained at all times when not confined in a vehicle or tent. Leashes must be no longer than six feet. All waste must be properly removed. (See our "Pets in Parks" brochure for details.)
