Farewell Bend State Park

Reserve early! Reserve campsites and cabins two days to nine months in advance by calling Reservations Northwest (1-800-452-5687) or visiting www.oregonstateparks.org. Group areas are reservable only by phone.

Farewell Bend State Park lies near the Snake River's Brownlee Reservoir, where homesteaders traveling on the historic Oregon Trail once rested and enjoyed one last look at the river before heading into the high desert.

Park Amenities

- 91 electrical sites with water
- 30 tent sites with water nearby
- Hiker/biker sites
- Two log cabins (open seasonally)
- Group tent camp
- Picnic tables and fire rings at all sites
- Hot showers and flush toilets
- Firewood and ice available for purchase
- RV dump station
- Horseshoe pits, basketball hoops, and volleyball court

Universal Access

Both cabins and electrical site #46 are accessible to campers with disabilities and are located near accessible restrooms.

Discovery Season

From October 1 - April 30, you can rent full, electric, or tent sites for less. At most state parks, including Farewell Bend, you can get \$4 off summer rates.

Play It Safe

Enjoy the park, but please obey posted safety rules. This is a remote area, and emergency assistance may be difficult to reach or take longer to arrive.

A Name from the Past

After following the Snake River for 330 miles, Oregon Trail travelers rested above the bend in the river here, then bid farewell to the river and continued their trek.

Wagon ruts can still be seen north of the park. Look for a small iron cross visible from U.S. 30 that marks the location where Snake River Shoshone Indians battled with the emigrants in 1860. Restored covered wagons rest at the park entrance and next to the Oregon Trail kiosk. Visit the National Historic Oregon Trail Interpretive Center on Flagstaff Hill just east of Baker City.

Cabin Camping

Stay at the park while enjoying a roof over your head by renting one of our log cabins from May 1 through Sept. 30. Each cabin is 13 ft. by 13 ft. with a six-foot-long porch. A full bed and two bunks with vinyl-covered mattresses sleep four people. Each has electricity, heat, and air conditioning.

Brownlee Reservoir

The park's boat ramp and dock lead to Brownlee Reservoir. To check on current reservoir levels, call the park at 541-869-2365 or Idaho Power at 1-800-422-3143. You can also visit www.idahopower.com. Brownlee Reservoir has excellent bass and catfish fishing. There is a fish-cleaning station by the boat ramp parking lot.

Day-Use Parking Fees

Day-use parking permits are required year-round at Farewell Bend State Park. You must display a daily permit, a 12- or 24-month permit, or your camping receipt. Your camping receipt is equal to a daily permit for each of the days you are registered. You can purchase a daily permit at the registration booth or at a day-use fee station. The 12-month and 24-month permits are sold at major state park offices and through Reservations Northwest (1-800-452-5687).

Nature Shows

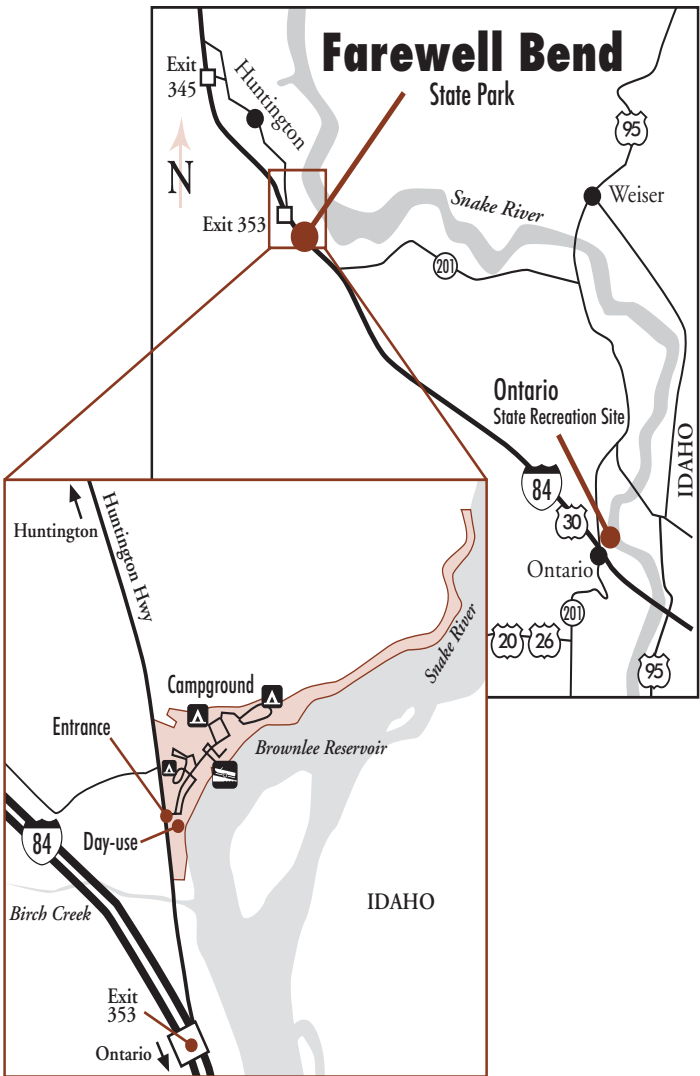
Wildflowers decorate the hillsides at Farewell Bend in the spring and summer. If you're lucky, you'll see wildlife like deer, pronghorn antelope, geese, eagles, and chukar and Hungarian partridges. Evening interpretive programs are presented from Memorial Day through Labor Day. See the park host for current schedules.

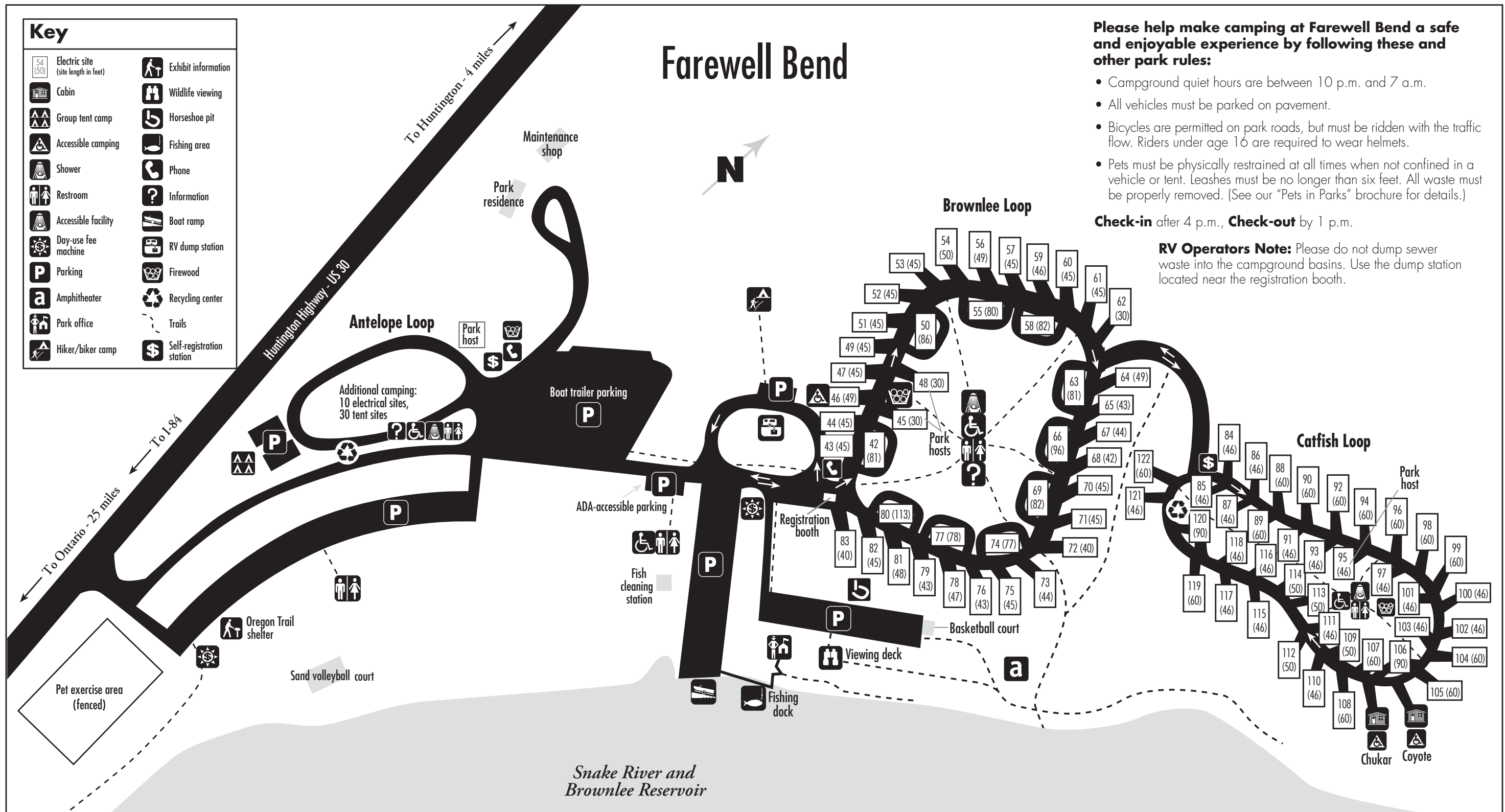
Visit a Frontier Town

In 1870, 14 years before the railroad arrived in the area, Miller's Stagecoach Station was established in nearby Huntington. The town soon became a shipping point for cattle. Please help make camping at Farewell Bend a safe and enjoyable experience by following these and other park rules:

- Campground quiet hours are between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.
- All vehicles must be parked on pavement.
- Bicycles are permitted on park roads, but must be ridden with the traffic flow. Riders under age 16 are required to wear helmets.
- Pets must be physically restrained at all times when not confined in a vehicle or tent. Leashes must be no longer than six feet. All waste must be properly removed. (See our "Pets in Parks" brochure for details.)

Check-in after 4 p.m., **Check-out** by 1 p.m.

RV Operators Note: Please do not dump sewer waste into the campground basins. Use the dump station located near the registration booth.
