Featuring sparkling freshwater lakes and towering dunes right next door, Jessie M. Honeyman is Oregon's second largest state park campground.

- Paved parking, picnic table, and fire ring at all sites

- RV dump station (please use the station to dump a full holding tank instead of a campsite connection, which can overflow)

Universal Access

Four campsites (#18, 131, 159, and 372) and two yurts (#28 and 404) are accessible to campers with disabilities.

- Nature center (located near the playground in F loop)
- Reservable picnic shelters
- Playground
- Amphitheater for evening programs
- Camp store at Cleawox (offers souvenirs, snacks, interpretive items, and boat rentals Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day)

Discovery Season

From October 1–April 30, you can rent a full, electric, or tent site for less. At most state parks, including Jessie M. Honeyman, you can get \$4 off summer rates.

Yurts!

Enjoy the year-round comforts of a domed tent with structural support, a wood floor, a lockable wooden door, lights, heat, and beds with vinyl-covered mattresses. A bunk bed sleeps three, and a futon couch sleeps two. A fire ring, a picnic table, and paved parking are right outside. Up to two pets (cats and/or dogs only) are allowed in the pet-friendly yurt.

Dunes North, Dunes South

The Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area stretches 47 miles from Florence to Coos Bay. Two miles of dunes separate Jessie M. Honeyman from the shoreline (please note that there are no marked trails leading to the beach from the park). All-terrain vehicles (ATVs) can access the dunes from the South Jetty road north of the park. Bring your own ATV, or take a buggy tour offered by commercial operators near the park. If you're camping in the H loop during Discovery Season (October-April), you can drive directly onto the dunes. At certain times of the year, vehicles are prohibited on the beach (check the Oregon highway map). The Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area visitor center in Reedsport (18 miles south) has more information.

Freshwater Jewels

Jessie M. Honeyman contains two lakes: Cleawox Lake, located west of U.S. 101, and Woahink Lake, on the east side of the highway. Both offer boating, swimming, and fishing for stocked rainbow trout. Cleawox is a swimmer's delight bounded by dunes that can also be enjoyed from a rented canoe or kayak or from the fishing pier. Woahink offers anglers the chance to hook native cutthroat trout and largemouth bass in addition to rainbow trout. The park's meeting hall looks out on Woahink Lake.

Reminders of the Past

The camp store building is one of several structures built by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) in the 1930s. Others include three kitchen/picnic shelters, the park's administrative building, and stone curbings. All of the buildings are listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Hiking Through the Park

CCC crews originally developed some of the park's trails, including the half-mile that connects the Cleawox picnic areas with the campground. This trail follows portions of the

Cleawox and Lily Lake shorelines, which are bordered by a profusion of the park's rhododendron bushes. Other trails link the campground and the Cleawox day-use area with the park's group camp and Woahink Lake. A highway overpass makes the connector trail from the campground a safe and convenient route for both pedestrians and bicyclists.

Celebrate the Rhododendrons

Visit Florence in mid-May during its annual Rhododendron Festival. It's a great time to camp at Honeyman, with bushes blooming almost everywhere.


Day-Use Area Parking Fees



Day-use areas are located along the shores of both Cleawox and Woahink lakes. Facilities include reservable picnic shelters, public swimming areas, and boat ramps. In the Cleawox day-use area and all other areas in the park west of Highway 101, a daily parking permit is required year-round. An Oregon Pacific Coast Passport, a valid camping receipt, or a 12- or 24-month permit are accepted. You can purchase daily permits in nearby vending machines, and 12- and 24-month permits at most major state park offices.
